Medtronic Site Redevelopment Planning

On Jan 9, the City hosted an open house for the community to learn more about potential redevelopment plans for the Medtronic site at 800 53rd Ave NE. Community Development Director Aaron Chirpich and HKGi Vice President Bryan Harjes led a presentation that gave attendees an overview of the project background and explained some of the economic factors influencing redevelopment options and the need for a Comprehensive Plan Amendment to revise the site's land-use guidance. Two design concepts were reviewed, followed by a Q&A session and an opportunity for community members to speak directly with staff and officials. Following the open house, a public feedback tool was opened for the community to provide input over a two-week period.

The proposed Comprehensive Plan Amendment that would change the site's land-use guidance went before the Planning Commission at their Feb 6 meeting. The Planning Commission will provide the City Council with a recommendation to authorize submission of the Comprehensive Plan Amendment to the Metropolitan Council at the Feb 26 meeting. There will be a 60-day review period by the Metropolitan Council, and no land use entitlements will be considered until the Metropolitan Council approves the amendment.

CHPD in the Community

The Columbia Heights Police Department is partnering with Columbia Heights High School to form a mentoring program with the boys' varsity basketball team. Each week, the group meets to talk and share a meal. At the start of the program, students were given the opportunity to share their goals with the group. To provide guidance and support, the Police Officers speak on various topics each week that are tailored toward the students' goals. Topics are relevant to the students' personal lives as well as their lives as student-athletes. To further support the relationship with the players,

the officers have committed to attending the boys' basketball games throughout the season.

The department is also excited to resume its partnership with Big Brothers Big Sisters. CHPD has partnered with the Big Brothers Big Sisters Mentoring Program for 12+ years and looks forward to having our officers and City staff partner with our local students. Our department members will serve as mentors to students from our local elementary schools and will begin building relationships through guidance, mentoring, and academic/personal support.

Protect Yourself from Auto Theft

The CHPD has received several reports of thefts from vehicles and reports of stolen vehicles. We ask the community not to store valuable property, including firearms, in cars.

Remember to lock your vehicles, do not leave vehicles idling with the keys in the ignition, and report all suspicious activity to 911.

CHPD has partnered with the Anoka County Auto Theft Task Force to address these issues, and extra enforcement has been occurring.

ORDINANCE REMINDER: NUISANCE ANIMALS

While many residents are aware that animals like chickens are allowed in the City, the Police Department is getting more frequent calls regarding roosters. City ordinance does apply to animals that make too much noise. Ordinance 8.101 prohibits animals that "habitually or frequently bark or cry to the annoyance of neighbors or the general public." Roosters are notorious for excessive noise in the early morning, and the close proximity of residences in the City makes this even more of a nuisance. The Police Department asks the community to choose wisely when selecting animals and to be good neighbors by addressing noisy animals such as roosters and dogs that bark excessively.

Columbia Heights Fire Explorers

The Columbia Heights Fire Explorer Program works with teens and young adults aged 14-21 who are interested in learning about Fire and EMS service. The group meets every Tuesday at the Public Safety Building and trains using the same types of fire and EMS curriculum as the Fire Department. In time, participants can work shifts with the firefighters and respond to calls (except situations that are dangerous to life and health). Many Explorers go on to become firefighters (seven of the current CHFD firefighters started out in the Fire Explorers program).

Explorers receive their own turnout gear for their time in the program, get annual CPR certification, compete at the State Fair's Fire Explorer Competition, and represent the Fire Department at several City events throughout the year. Participants say they like being able to work alongside real firefighters and appreciate having real EMS training.

Recreational Fire Update

New this year, the City of Columbia Heights no longer requires residents to obtain Recreational Fire Permits.

Please keep in mind that **all safety requirements related to recreational fires still apply**, and residents may be subject to citation or revocation of privileges if rules are violated.

- Only clean, dry firewood can be burned. Never burn trash, leaves, yard waste, or construction debris.
- · Recreational fires are not permitted on windy days
- · Fires must be contained in a fire pit or ring
- Fires must be extinguished by 11 pm

Trex Recycling Challenge

Thank you for continuing to recycle your plastic bags and film! Our Recycling Center typically collects about three tons of plastic per year, resulting in Trex park benches that have been placed throughout the community. Our Public Works Department recently installed two benches at Huset Park (see right), replacing very old benches that were overdue for an upgrade. Can't make it to the Recycling Center on Saturdays? Plastic bags and film can also be dropped off at City Hall (3989 Central Ave NE). There is a collection bin inside the entrance from the parking garage. Reminder: plastic must be clean and dry.





SPRING HYDRANT FLUSHING

Fire hydrant flushing takes place in April and early May. Hydrants are flushed between 7 am and 3 pm. It's necessary to flush all City hydrants annually to ensure they're in good working condition and to clear sediment. As a result of the flushing, you may notice some temporary discoloration of the water. Flush your residential system by running cold water for 10 to 20 minutes. Avoid washing clothes while hydrants are being flushed in your area, as discolored water may stain. Some localized flushing may be necessary at other times throughout the year.

Help Protect Our Watershed This Construction Season

Sediment-laden storm water runoff from active construction sites is one of the nation's leading water resource pollutants. Sediment and other pollutants from construction sites, such as cement, paint, fuel, and oil, can cause physical, chemical, and biological harm to our water resources. Polluted storm water runoff from construction sites can flow into the storm drain system and eventually discharge into our local rivers, lakes, wetlands, and streams.

If you know of a construction site that you think is contributing sediment to a road, street, or waterway (creek, river, pond, or lake), report it to the City.

What to look for:

- Muddy water flowing into street from construction site
- Tracking of mud into road from construction site
- Silt fences falling down
- Trash, litter and construction debris not cleaned up daily
- Concrete waste and wash water

The pre-order window will open in March and will remain open through April (or earlier if all trees are claimed). Supplies are limited and are on a first-come, first-served basis.

All orders must be pre-paid; credit card payment is preferred, but checks are also accepted. Please mail or drop off checks at City Hall, 3989 Central Ave NE, Columbia Heights, MN 55421. The check memo should say "Arbor Day Tree Sale."

Public Works will deliver trees to properties in May.



Arm Truck Refuse Collection

Our waste hauler uses trucks with mechanical arms to empty your refuse and recycling carts (see left). To ensure the drivers can efficiently empty your carts, please follow these cart placement guidelines:

- Place your carts *behind* the curb line
- Allow space between your carts and other obstacles
- Never place carts in the street

Residents also have the option to have a refuse pad added to their property along with the City's annual concrete work. Refuse pads provide a dedicated area for refuse carts for approximately \$12/square foot. For more information, contact **publicworks@columbiaheightsmn.gov**.

Yard Waste Season

Weekly yard waste collection typically begins in April after snow cover has melted. Leaves, grass clippings, garden waste, and small sticks/twigs should go in a City yard waste cart or compostable yard waste bags. Brush such as large sticks and branches should be bundled. Bundles should be no more than 3-feet in length and no more than 18 inches in diameter. To order a City yard waste cart, visit columbiaheightsmn.gov/refusesupport. Note: yard waste is picked up by College Hunks, so the schedule may not be the same as your Walter's schedule for trash and recycling. Visit columbiaheightsmn.gov/ yardwastemap to confirm your service day.

Please note that food organics can no longer be collected in yard waste carts after March. The City is working on a new organics collection program. Updates on the program will be shared with current compost cart customers, and on the Refuse News & Updates page at **columbiaheightsmn.gov/refuseupdates**.

Serve as an Election Judge

The City is accepting applications for individuals interested in serving as election judges in our upcoming 2024 elections.

To maintain balanced party representation at our polling places, we're in particular need of additional judges who are affiliated with the Republican or Legalize Marijuana Now parties or who are not affiliated with a major political party. Minnesota statute requires that no more than half of the election judges in a precinct may be members of the same major political party.

Election judges serve as polling place officials on Election Day. Some duties include opening and closing the polls, registering and signing in voters, distributing and collecting ballots, operating voting equipment, recording and certifying vote totals, and ensuring voters' rights are protected.
